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Introduction



CONTEXT

Overview

Whittlesea Park is a 25 hectare reserve, classified as a Municipal Open Space in the City of Whittlesea. It's located in the north of the municipality in the foothills of the Great Dividing Range, 60km north of Melbourne's CBD.

Surrounded by established residential areas and business, retail and education areas, the reserve is cited in the City of Whittlesea's Open Space Strategy to be upgraded to improve connectivity to and between open spaces to facilitate walking and cycling links between the residential area and town centres.

Situated within the catchment and tributaries of the Plenty River and influenced by three watercourses, Whittlesea Park has a high potential to provide both recreational and biodiversity values to the local communities.

Purpose

The Master Plan has been developed with the Whittlesea Showgrounds & Recreation Reserves Committee of Management. It aims to guide the implementation of staged development of structural facility provision and unstructured recreational use of the open space, as well as to review the existing management and maintenance agreements and provide direction for future arrangements. The Landscape Master Plan comprises of AF Walker Reserve, Lions Club Park, C. McDonald Reserve, J.T. Towt Park, Whittlesea Skate Park, River Street Reserve, and Little River Street Reserve.









The documents opposite prescribe a number of actions relating to the future planning and management of Whittlesea Park, in summary:


- Improved access, particularly with a view of enhancing safety and creating more connected trail networks including sealed (all-weather) paths, shared-use paths as well as improving road crossings. Better connection of Whittlesea Park to the town centre and key existing community facilities is also a key directive within the strategic documents.
- A number of the documents outline broad directives to enhance and protect the natural environment and the ecological systems of the Park as well as increasing tree canopy cover, protecting existing trees and in turn providing better shade amenity.
- Lighting of the Park is referenced in the context of ensuring specific programmed lighting for particular uses. Safety is considered exclusive of broader illumination of the Park owing to the context.
- Ensuring the evaluation and targeted upgrade and appropriate maintenance of existing facilities and infrastructure (as well as opportunities for new facilities) is a directive in a number of strategies relating to sports, recreation and parkland amenities.
- The retention of a rural character and natural features of the open space is a targeted
 action and the Park is not identified as being appropriate for major change in the context of
 its location and the scale and nature of the township.


Improve Pedestrian Links

Increased urban densities resulting in greater reliance on public open space to meet a broader range of needs, particularly social and informal uses."







The site is heavily influenced by flood plain. Proposed development needs to be away from the temporary storage of floodwater in order to minimises flood damage.



ACCESS & SAFETY Existing Conditions Analysis

Whittlesea Township sits approximately 10km north of the Mernda at which the train service terminates. Bus access to the site is available. Primarily visitors arrive by car, or locally on foot or bicycle.

Visitors to the site have several entry points, with parking provided informally along the adjacent streets, and some with formal parking that is associated with the sporting and swim facilities. The parking largely comprises of unsealed surfaces.


Access with the site is abundant but has some missing links and there are areas of the site disconnected due to the waterways passing through the site.

Bridges that cross the waterways are in various forms, quality, and levels of compliance. There is opportunity for most of these to be assessed and upgraded, and should be from a standard material and style palette.






CONSIDERATIONS

- Existing cypress avenue in decline with recent removals for safety. Consider aborist to audit as an avenue and succession plan across the park
- Limited tree cover to paths. Consider increasing provision of shade to improve path amenity, and to strengthen path networks, including the town centre connection.
 Reference Whittlesea Natural and Built Shade Policy and Greening Whittlesea City Forest Strategy
- Some of the existing tree cover, particularly around waterways are suckering or selfseeding non-native species. Consider management plan with Water Authorities
- Consider deciduous trees (without weediness tendencies) for seasonal interest around new facilities. Generally locate away from the waterways
- Limited garden bed planting. Consider increasing planting around new facilities to improve visual interest, habitat and biodiversity
- Weeds around waterways. Consider dvelopement of a weed management and revegetation plan together with water authorities and relevant stakeholders
- Maintain open character of grassed areas for active and passive recreation and use for overflow carparking during event days
- Consider new tree planting for any new car parking areas, including street trees for onstreet parking

CONSIDERATIONS

- Limited bicycle parking, consider increasing provision in association with new amenities to encourage bicycle use. Reference Whittlesea Bicycle * Plan
- The sports field is a non-standard and could be upgraded to a standard shape and size
- Tennis courts appear to be in an acceptable condition
- Playgrounds are small for the size of the Park and in older condition. Both should be considered for upgrades to provide greater play opportunities
- Vehicle exclusion fencing is of various styles around the site. Consider excluding vehicular access into site from Laurel Street to make better use of the

- space and increase pedestrian safety, which would also make much of the fencing redundant
- Existing below ground services (water, power, etc) generally sit to the perimeter of the Park following existing street networks. The existing sewer locations are important in assessing the feasibility and location of potential new toilet facilities and drinking fountains
- Bins are generally provided close to picnic tables and BBQ facilities and the dog park. These can be increased to supplement new picnic facilities and include recycling bins
- Drinking fountains are provided to existing sports facilities, the dog park, and Lions Club Park, and should be increased to supplement new facilities
- Lighting within the Park is limited to the sports facilities and the Bandstand. This limits after dark broader use of the Park, and access from Laurel to Evelyn Street which could be reconsidered with new amenities. Improvement of through connections. Reference Whittlesea Park Lighting Strategy
- Entry signage is inconsistent around the site as a whole; a consistent sign would assist in unifying the site
- Wayfinding signage is limited and should be assessed holistically, and link to the Town Centre and nearby amenities such as the Library, Swim Centre, Showgrounds and Market





OPPORTUNITIES

TOPOGRAPHICAL FEATURES AND DRAINAGE

- Maximise the usable, functional spaces within the Park, particularly those above flood overlays for active recreation and potential for new amenities and infrastructure.
- Investigate the hydrological systems and performance associated with the Park's waterways and look for opportunities where improved water quality, better flood mitigation and habitat may be developed.
- Look for opportunities to take advantage of natural corridors and vantage points for viewing locations both from a user experience and safety, passive surveillance perspective.
- Add value to existing drainage lines and swales with designed outcomes that improve aesthetic qualities and may reduce maintenance requirements.

ACCESS AND SAFETY

- Access compliance and safety could be enhanced by retaining existing paths / trails but upgrading with sealed finishes (asphalt/concrete) and improved gradients and widths.
- Consider new links or sections of pathways that could create continuous 'loop' walking, running and cycling circuits through and around the Park to increase opportunities for exercise and improved safety.
- Look for options to extend, modify or upgrade existing bridge crossings over the waterways to create wider and safer access. Liaise with water and VicRoads authorities as required.
- Upgrade existing informal parking areas to marked bays with sealed finishes to increase functionality, capacity and safety.
- Opportunity to provide safer (formal) pedestrian crossing over Beech Street between the Showgrounds and the Park, noting the pedestrian movements that occur particularly for overflow parking during events. (Liaison with VicRoads required).
- Advocate to PTV for improved public transport facilities, including bus stops located on Beech Street which are sub-standard and not DDA accessible.
- Investigate removal of public vehicular access and informal parking within the Park area, excepting controlled maintenance access.
- Review opportunities for improved cyclist access to the site, including a continuous, highquality shared path link on Laurel Street, to provide connectivity to the town centre and existing network on Plenty Road.
- The future Whittlesea Rail Trail and/or Plenty River Trail extension may terminate in the vicinity of site. Review opportunities for integration of end-of-trip facilities or trail parking.
- Review opportunities for improved pedestrian linkages to Whittlesea Town Centre, including pedestrian crossings on Forest Street

ENVIRONMENT AND LANDSCAPE

- Consider opportunities for increased natural shade through new tree plantings. Locations could be targeted to higher use areas and along existing paths and edges.
- Build upon the existing specimen tree plantings within the Park to develop a mixed botanical character and themed or grouped species collections.
- Undertake a comprehensive assessment and management plan for existing mature trees including safety audits and long-term plans for progressive replacement and supplementary plantings.
- Investigate opportunities for new ephemeral and aquatic plantings in the vicinity of waterways
 that can add ecological value by providing an improved water quality function such as nutrient
 removal and support for biodiversity and native habitat.
- Evaluate open grass areas and consider opportunities for defining specific uses and maintenance requirements such as formal, manicured areas or meadows.

INFRASTRUCTURE & AMENITIES

- Evaluate the condition and functionality of all existing park structures and furniture (such as seating, shade, play, picnic, bridges etc.) Look for opportunities to renew, upgrade or supplement.
- Car parking for the various uses is provided in separate and fragmented parking areas, which
 are not easily navigable to those unfamiliar with the precinct. New facilities will likely attract
 additional parking demands. Investigate opportunities for new, consolidated parking locations
 to service parking needs.
- Investigate spatial opportunities for new and upgraded play facilities within the park including the feasibility of a regional play space.
- Installation of a regional playground and improvements to existing facilities is likely to increase
 the volume of drivers attracted to the precinct, primarily via the Forest Street / Beech Street
 intersection. Investigate opportunities for safety or capacity upgrades at this intersection.
- Consider opportunities for both way-finding and interpretive signage which could improve the navigability and safety of the park as well as highlighting stories of the natural features and cultural heritage of the site.
- Assess the provision and condition of existing sports facilities and consider opportunities for upgrades and additions. Specifically, look for spatial opportunities to provide an additional netball court, where existing facilities lack capacity.
- Consider the spatial arrangements and location of any new infrastructure and facilities with existing requirements – including maximising the capacity for the park to accommodate periodic overflow parking for events.



Consultation Summary



CONSULTATION SUMMARY

Community Consultation was held from 20 September to 31 October 2022 to exhibit the draft Master Plan to the community and to receive feedback on the 13 key recommendations. Feedback has been used to finalise the Master Plan and develop an Implementation Strategy

Overall, the community provided a large amount of support for the master plan and key recommendations. This was demonstrated through the survey and voting poll.

SUMMARY OF FEEDBACK

- Open spaces and nature including trees and creeks are the items most valued to the community in a public open space.
- Whittlesea Park is valued for having large open spaces with nature. The community would like to retain the open space, replace old trees and clean up the creek corridors.
- The most popular key recommendations are the Circuit path, playground and public toilets.
- Majority of participants would like the future public toilets located at Walnut Street, but ensuring that it is accessible to the playground.
- The community would like to ensure that the park is safe to all users. Lighting should be included in the master plan along with CCTV in high-risk areas e.g. the skate park, better fences and improved access across Beech Street.
- Participants would like the future playground to include equipment which caters to teens and people with disabilities, plenty of shelter, bins, and park furniture. Participants would also like to see improved access to the public toilets from the playground.
- Participants would like the master plan to further considers making the site RV friendly.
- Further acknowledge the history of the site.

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

With review of the consultation findings, the follow items are recommended to be include in the final master plan

- Provide a priority rating based on the feedback, with the circuit path, playground upgrade and new public toilets as the highest priority.
- Update master plan to show the future public toilets at Walnut Street
- Further consider pathway lighting along main path links
- Develop the playground concept to include equipment which cater to teens and people with disabilities
- Provide improved access from the playground to the public toilets on Walnut street
- Explore the option for RV friendly facilities on the site
- Further acknowledge the history of the site including the place names.

MASTER PLAN GOALS

- Create a strong <u>identity</u> for Whittlesea Park as a highly-valued and recognisable place
- Maintain and improve the provision of the Park facilities and amenities
- · Protect and enhance the Park environment
- Enhance and develop a strong sense of <u>community</u> associated with the park
- Provide a well- defined, safe and <u>accessible</u> connections within the Park and the Whittlesea Township

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

1. UPGRADE ENTRANCES

Improve the access into the reserve and connection to surrounding facilities

2. PLAYGROUND

Upgrade the playground to provide a greater diversity in play, suitable for varied age groups. Provide picnic areas with BBQ facilities.

3. CIRCUIT PATH

Create a 3m wide circuit path, with bridge crossings, nature walk and fitness stations

4. BRIDGE ACCESS

Upgrade and provide new bridge crossings across Scrubby Creek, Plenty River and Bruces Creek. Investigate a bridge crossing to provide access from Sherwin Street

5. TREE STRATEGY

Develop a Tree Strategy that includes and audit of existing trees, proposed tree species list and plans to replace trees at the end of their useful life

6. CAR PARKING

Formalise car parking facilities including the street parking along Laurel and Forest Street and upgrade the car parking facilities off Walnut street to increase the amount of parking spaces. Provide an additional car park off Beech Street.

7. BEECH STREET

Improve the Beech Street frontage and provide a safe access to the Whittlesea Showgrounds

8. DOG OFF-LEASH PARK

Upgrade the Dog Off-leash Park with an improved surface treatment, additional trees and a quiet dog zone.

9. ACTIVE RECREATION

Upgrade the AF Walker sportfield to create a consistent shape and provide a ball catching fence. Enhance the active recreation zone with the construction of a basketball court.

10. PUBLIC TOILETS

Provide a public toilet facility at the Walnut Street entrance to service the Skate Park and playground and investigate the option for future public toilet facilities at Laurel Street

11. MULTI-USE AREA

Retain the CFA training area and upgrade to include multi- use facilities including a Learn-to-ride, exercise track and netball courts

12. IMPROVE CREEK CORRIDORS

Collaborate with Melbourne Water to improve the quality of waterway vegetation

13. INTERPRETIVE SIGNAGE

Develop an interpretive signage plan that provides education on the cultural history of the areas





- Establish a clear and welcoming entrance forecourt with wayfinding signage
- Formalise car parking (67 spaces off-street + 16 spaces on-street + 2 disabled spaces) and include opportunites for WSUD.

- Provide public toilet amenities

- Build upon the character of this area to celebrate the history of the site, including interpretive signage, and garden bed planting
- Retain and protect existing trees which form the backdrop to the bandstand, and review as part of the future Tree Strategy
- Supplement the trees with additional specimen tree planting to provide succession of trees to replace the existing trees as they reach their end of life
- 10 Provide shelters and social gathering spaces







PLAYSPACE CONCEPT DESIGN

ACCESS AND AMENITIES

The proposed playspace is located between Lime Street and Laurel Street with upgraded car parking facilities. The playspace is placed between the existing public toilets at AF Walker Reserve and the future public toilets facilities at the Walnut Street entrance. A combination of natural and built shade is provided

O1 Provide a picnic area with multiple shelters and picnic settings, BBQ facilities, drinking fountain, bicycle parking and bins

PLAY

- Provide a dedicated junior play space with the provision of junior play units and an accessible sandpit
- O3 Senior play with challenging climbing opportunities. Provide a climbing and sliding play complex with a ropes play course
- Nature-based play opportunities. Build upon the existing trees and vegetation as well as new plantings to develop an unstructured nature play area with timber logs, steppers, boulders and sensory planting to maximise the natural-based play experience while encouraging children's physical and mental development
- Play equipment for all ages and abilities includes in-ground trampolines for wheelchair access, basket swings and seat options for all ages and abilities, as well as an accessible spinner. Other items such as musical instruments, sand pits with sand-play tables can also be considered
- Create a grass mound with a rock scramble and an embankment slide to provide challenging landform and enhance play experience. The landform also raises the levels, to reduce the the risk of innundation as it straddles the Rural Flood Overlay
- O7 Provide both formal and informal seating opportunities within the playspace, including a shelter

Provide fitness equipment stations for all ages next to the multi-court and along Nature Circuit including senior's fitness equipment

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In 2022, the City of Whittlesea, in partnership with the Whittlesea Showgrounds and Recreation Reserve Committee of Management (CoM) developed a draft Master Plan for Whittlesea Park which creates a shared vision between Council, the CoM and the Community.

The purpose of the community engagement was to seek feedback on the draft Master Plan, including the 13 key recommendations.

A range of methods were undertaken to engage with and gain feedback from the community, including:

- Online survey
- Pop-up sessions located around Whittlesea Township
- Feedback via phone
- Feedback vie email

Through the consultation, a wide range of people were consulted including children, young people and adults. A total of 399 formal responses were received.

1. Background

Participation and Engagement Findings Report

1.1 Project Overview

The Whittlesea Township Plan adopted by Council on the 1st June 2021 features an action plan which seeks the creation of a Master Plan for the development of Whittlesea Park, with a clear prioritisation of actions and recommendations. This will provide the Whittlesea Township with increased access to the 25 hectare open space and aid in Council's future capital investment, grant applications, maintenance and management of the reserve.

The City of Whittlesea partnered with the Whittlesea Showgrounds and Reserves Committee of Management (CoM) to co-develop a draft Master Plan with local sports clubs and other key stakeholder groups.

This Master Plan provides the City of Whittlesea, the CoM and the Whittlesea community with a vision, direction and prioritisation of future improvements over the next 5 to 10 years. The vision of the Draft Master Plan is to:

• Create a strong identity for Whittlesea Park as a highly valued and recognisable place;



- Maintain and improve the provision of the park facilities and amenities;
- Protect and enhance the park environment;
- Enhance and develop a strong sense of community associated with the park; and
- Provide well-defined, safe and accessible connections within the park and the Whittlesea Township.

The draft Master Plan has a focus on a series of key action items to deliver the vision of the Master Plan. The key recommendations are as follows:

- 1. Upgrade entrances: Improve the access into the reserve and connection to surrounding facilities
- 2. Playground: Upgrade the playground to provide greater diversity in play, suitable for varied age groups and abilities. Provide picnic areas with BBQ facilities and supporting public furniture.
- 3. Circuit path: Create a 3 metre wide circuit path, with bridge crossings, nature walk and fitness stations.
- 4. Bridge access: Upgrade and provide new bridge crossings across Scrubby Creek, Plenty River and Bruces Creek. Investigate a bridge crossing to provide access from Sherwin Street.
- 5. Tree Strategy: Develop a Tree Strategy that includes an audit of existing trees, proposed tree species list and plans to replace trees at the end of their useful life.
- 6. Car parking: Formalise car parking facilities including the street parking along Laurel Street and Forest Street and upgrade the car parking facilities off Walnut Street to increase the amount of parking spaces. Provide an additional car park off Beech Street.
- 7. Beech Street: Improve the Beech Street frontage and provide safe access to the Whittlesea Showgrounds.
- 8. Dog Off-leash Park: Upgrade the existing Dog Off-leash Park with an improved surface treatment, additional trees and a quiet dog zone.
- 9. Active Recreation: Upgrade the AF Walker Recreation Reserve sportfield to create a consistent shape and provide perimeter fencing and ball catching fence. Enhance the active recreation zone with the construction of a basketball court
- 10. Public Toilets: Provide a public toilet facility at the Walnut Street entrance to service the skate park and playground and investigate the option for future public toilet facilities at Laurel Street.
- 11. Multi-use area: Retain the Fire Rescue Victoria (CFA) training area and upgrade to include multi-use facilities including a learn-to-ride, exercise track and netball courts.
- 12. Improve creek corridors: Collaborate with Melbourne Water and the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) to improve the quality of waterway and onsite vegetation.



13. Interpretive signage: Develop an interpretive signage plan that provides way finding and education on the cultural history of the areas.

1.2 Purpose

The purpose of the engagement was to confirm that the draft Master Plan caters to the needs of the community. Consultation findings will be presented to the CoM for discussion and the feedback will be used to refine the Master Plan and assign a priority listing to the key action items.

Aim:

- Inform the local community of the project and encourage them to share their feedback.
- Understand how the broader community uses the reserve and how they would like to see the reserve used in the future.
- Receive feedback on the draft Master Plan, confirming whether it caters to the ongoing and future needs of the community.

The community feedback on the draft park design will be used to inform the final design.




Image 2: Advisory Board installed at entrances to Whittlesea Park in September 2022



This section provides results from the online and in-person surveys completed by 186 community members.


Question 1: Do you currently use Whittlesea Park?

84.11% of participants had used the park before while 18.89% participants had not.




Question 2: Is there a reason you do not use Whittlesea Park?

Of the 5.6% of participants who have not used Whittlesea Park beofre, majority thought it was outdated and old, while others did not have a reason. Some people did not feel safe and others thought it did not meet their neesds.



Question 3: What do you do when you are visiting Whittlesea Park? (select up to 3) Majority of participants go to the park to walk/run (82.35%), enjoy nature (61.18%) or use

the Dog Off-leash Park (34.12%). Few people use the bandstand (8.24%), play or watch tennis (9.41%) or use the CFA training area (11.76%).



Question 4: What do you love or value about Whittlesea park? (Short Answer)

By far the most valued aspect of the Park is the large open space (35 responses). The community also value that the park is close to the town and contains natural scenery, trees, creeks and green areas. The community see it as a quiet and peaceful space which offers seclusion. Some participants noted that they enjoy assets such as the play equipment, dog park, bandstand and skate park.

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"Not many places have such a big usable space for the community."

"Easy access by foot and car, especially easy for old folk like me who can't walk far to go to the dog park or take the grandkids to play. I like that it is not too formal and sanitized. Suits the country feel of Whittlesea."

"I love the serenity, I love the little lake, and the nature, I've loved the Cypress walkway since I was a little girl, my children also loved the walkway and one of my now grown up Grandchildren always wanted to go walking there she named it The Magical Forest when she was only three years old.

I hope that isn't going to go"

"Ability to get away from the main road and feel that the kids are safe on bikes/walking without risk crossing the bridges on the main road.

Exploring nature, enjoying the waterways, the freedom of space, the current limited kids' areas (loving the skatepark improvements)."

"Nothing - it's not maintained well enough to use for picnics etc. It floods too often resulting in water and rubbish pooling that goes stagnant and smells terrible. It is an eyesaw and embarrassing."

Key themes from the short answer questions:

- Open space (35 responses)
- Accessibility/ proximity to town (13 responses)
- Nature/ green areas/ natural scenery (11 responses)
- The trees (10 responses)
- Peace & quite (6 responses)
- The creek corridor (6 responses)



Question 5: Thinking more broadly than Whittlesea Park, what are the 3 most important features in a park or reserve?


49% of participants thought that trees were the most important feature in a park or reserve, followed by places to gather (43.42%), public toilets (34.62%) and pathways and trails (34.62%). Items that participants did not think were as important was Educational signage and carparking (1.92%). Other items which were suggested were Dog parks, Swimming pools and fencing.





Question 6: Overall, how happy you with the draft landscape Master Plan?

Overall, majority of participants like the draft Master Plan (51.02%), 22.45% can live with it and 20.41% love it. Only 6.12% dislike the plan and 0% hate it.



Question 7: Do you have any ideas for improving the Whittlesea Park draft Master Plan? (short answer)



The short answer responses to this question varied, without main themes or trends. Ideas included items such as providing more varied play equipment, including RV facilities and providing lighting. Many of the ideas suggested have already been included within the master plan, outside of the 13 key recommendations.

"Better use of the river park - seems silly that we have this amazing public space that is funded by the public to maintain but it is only used 2 days a year for the Show parking? Not a great use of public funds?."

"Not enough options for children with disabilities- would love to see trampolines, water play with troughs, etc - the all abilities park in mill park is fantastic for this and the have swing seats for children with disabilities"

"Clean up creeks with seating along pathways that follow the creeks.

They are lovely creeks and could be made beautiful areas if they were cleaned up and grass was kept mowed."

"Perhaps we should look at Whittlesea being an RV friendly town a dump point at Showgrounds. 2 night show ground stays for travellers in self contained vehicles"

Summary of ideas to improve the Master Plan:

- Include outdoor fitness equipment
- Provided picnic area to sit near the playground
- Ensure a better use of River Street Park
- Incorporate the historical names of the reserve e.g. A.F Walker, George Sherwin, J.W
 Towt Reserve, etc.
- Need more play equipment including options for kids with disabilities
- Retain the treed avenues
- Involve community groups in the creation (e.g. Garden club, Men's shed, secondary students,
- Provide vehicle barriers along the main road
- Provide parking for food trucks
- Include video surveillance to the skate park
- Provided lighting throughout the park, particularly along pathways
- Complete upgrade to the dog park including shade and quiet dog zone
- Include a water/ splash park
- Provide more seats and tables throughout the park
- Remove weeds, particularly in the creek corridors



Question 8: Which if the key recommendation do you think are the most important?

Of the 13 key recommendations, the participants thought the most important was the circuit path (48.94%), the playground (41.49%) and the public toilets (35.11%). These responses differ slightly from previous feedback where the natural and open space were the most important aspects of the reserve.


The recommendations which received least support were the Interpretive signage (3.19%), upgrades to Beech Street (5.32%) and car parking (10.64%).





Question 9: If new public toilet facilities are installed in Whittlesea Park, where do you think is the best location?

Majority of participants wanted the proposed toilet facilities to be located at the Walnut Street entrance (66.67%) with only 33.33% requesting that they are located at the laurel Street entrance.



Question 10: Do you have anything else you would like to share on the draft Master Plan? (short answer)

Responses to this question mainly reiterated the ideas and feedback already provided within he survey. Participants provided additional feedback on public toilets, including the suggestions that only one new public toilet was required and that the existing public toilets



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needed to be upgraded. Participants also provided suggestions for improved facilities and assets and to improve access and safety.

"Fences around playground to help single parents feel comfortable that their children are safe in the playground. Public toilets to access for all children (in particular) are currently not adequate.

Lights around the paths because at night its

extremely dark for those walking home

through the park."

"there are already public toilets at Laurel St on the side of the pavillion, they just need cleaning up"

"It's great to see the collaboration between the Council & the Reserves Management Committee to better manage and develop Whittlesea Park, let's make it a destination of choice."




Question 12: What is your age?

Majority of participants identify as female (56.44%) followed by male (38.61%)






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


Question 20. Which suburb do you live in?

Majority of participants live in Whittlesea Township (67%), followed by Eden Park (10.6%). There was lo participation rates form the rest of the municipality.







Participants were able to vote for their three favourite recommendations. Of the 382 participants, 243 were adults and 28 were children.

The most popular recommendation was the Upgraded playground (19.1%), followed by public toilets (16.6%), circuit path (11%) and then the upgraded dog off leash park (10%).

While these results differ from the online survey, it still demonstrates the important of the Circuit path, playground and public toilets as the three most important items to the community

4. Limitations

The following limitations were experienced through the consultation process:


• Lack of interest from the community in participation:
While direct mail advising of the consultation was directly distributed to 1200, only
399 formal responses were received. This may be due to consultation fatigue.

5. Summary Results and Evaluation

Overall, the community provided a large amount of support for the master plan and key recommendations. This was demonstrated through the survey and voting poll. Much of the additional feedback provided was for other items already included in the draft master plan, but not as part of the 13 key recommendations.

Responses differed when participants were asked what the most important items in any public open space was, to what they thought were the most important items in the draft master plan.





- Open spaces and nature including trees and creeks are the items most valued to the community in a public open space
- Whittlesea Park is valued for having large open spaces with nature. The community would like to retain the open space, replace old trees and clean up the creek corridors.
- The most popular key recommendations are the Circuit path, playground and public toilets
- Majority of participants would like the future public toilets located at Walnut Street, but ensuring that it is accessible to the playground
- The community would like to ensure that the park is safe to all users. Lighting should be included in the master plan along with CCTV in high-risk areas e.g. the skate park, better fences and improved access across Beech Street.
- Participants would like the future playground to include equipment which caters to teens and people with disabilities, plenty of shelter, bins, and park furniture. Participants would also like to see improved access to the public toilets from the playground
- Participants would like the master plan to further considers making the site **RV** friendly
- Further acknowledge the history of the site

6. Key recommendations

With review of the consultation findings, the follow items are recommended to be include din the final master plan:

- Provide a priority rating based on the feedback, with the circuit path, playground upgrade and new public toilets as the highest priority.
- Update master plan to show the future public toilets at Walnut Street
- Further consider pathway lighting along main path links
- Develop the playground concept to include equipment which cater to teens and people with disabilities
- Provide improved access from the playground to the public toilets on Walnut
- Explore the option for RV friendly facilities on the site
- Further acknowledge the history of the site including the place names.
- Undertake further consultation with the CFA on the proposal for a learn to ride in the training area




Better dog parks, usable open grass areas that dont have 3 foot long grass

With the increase of traffic to the skatepark, markets and considering events held there - it is vital that this be a safe pedestrian path. My heart stops every time my kids ride this path with logging trucks, wide load pre-fab houses and general car traffic passing. I implore anyone who questions whether this is required to take their dog or young child or just to walk this section in peak traffic times and consider how safe one feels. Parking facilities for permitted food vans/coffee vans to attract more people to the park and perhaps an option for local cafes to take this opportunity to expand their business? Lighting options throughout. Video surveillance at the skatepark - maybe already installed? Already witnessed fights, which is really disappointing - however with the completion of the pump track I am hopefully with more parents present and young families, it will discourage kids from violent/bullying behavior.

Whittlesea lacks running track/ athletic facilities, if areas such as Donnybrook or like do not have this incorporated into the development- perhaps this could be incorporated into the walker reserve area? A central location for areas such as Kinglake, Doreen, Donnybrook, Whittlesea, Wallan, - encouraging fitness and giving more sporting/social options to the broader community and local schools.

Overall, very excited to see this area develop into a beautiful space for locals and for tourists. Whilst funfields is amazing for the local community and career opportunities - the township does not benefit from traffic which comes and goes without going through the town - a beautiful park and point of interest should see an increase in business to local traders.

Musicians playing there need to bring in chairs, and passers-by wanting shelter from the heat, have nowhere to sit.

The off-lead dog park has a seat, and it would be good to have a shade over it during hot weather. Could we have notices there about the need to pick up doggie poo. I have been going there for a few years now and very rarely see others picking up after their dogs. The water-lilies in the lake look lovely, but are always against a backdrop of blackberries. The blackberries are now spreading into the rest of the park. Perhaps they could all be removed.

It is important that the mowing is kept up regularly because of the risk of snakes which are attracted to the creek areas.



The entry and fencing of the show grounds also needs to be re done as part of the beautification - its terrible and an eyesaw as is the fencing around the Melbourne waterway.


It would be beneficial to bring in a small native/indigenous nursery (like that at La Trobe university Bundoora).




As part of this assessment the subject site has been inspected with due consideration of the development proposal, traffic and parking data has been sourced and relevant background reports have been reviewed.

2 EXISTING CONDITIONS

2.1 Site Location

The subject site is located east of the Whittlesea Town Centre and is generally bounded by River Street to the east, Forest Street to the west, Laurel Street to the south, and Beech Street (Whittlesea-Yea Road) to the north as shown in Figure 1 below.

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The site accommodates a range of recreation and community uses, including:

- > AF Walker Reserve
- Whittlesea Park
- Whittlesea Swimming Pool
- > River Street Reserve



- Whittlesea Lions Park
- > Whittlesea Showgrounds Netball Court and Car Park

Land use in the immediate vicinity of the site is varied, and includes Whittlesea Secondary College and Whittlesea Library to the south, largely residential uses to the east and west, and the Whittlesea Showgrounds and Monday Market to the north. The Plenty River runs north-south, centrally through the site.

An aerial view of the subject site is provided in Figure 2.

2.2 Planning Zones and Overlays

The site is comprised of a number of separate land parcels including 30 Yea Road, 35C Beech Street, and 2 Forest Street and is zoned Public Park and Recreation Zone (PPRZ) and Special Use Zone (SUZ1).

Whittlesea-yea road is designated Transport Zone (TZ2); Principal Road Network, under the control and management of Department of Transport (DoT).

An aqueduct runs north-south immediately east of River Street, which is designated a Public Use Zone (PUZ1).



2.3 Road Network

2.3.1 Beech Street (Whittlesea-Yea Road)

Beech Street (Whittlesea-Yea Road) is an arterial road extending generally north-east from central Whittlesea through to the Yea township.

At the frontage of the site it comprises a single traffic lane in either direction, with sealed shoulders Footpath facilities are provided along the southern side, and intermittently along the northern side.

A 60km/h speed limit applies to Beech Street (Whittlesea-Yea Road) in the vicinity of the site.

2.3.2 River Street

River Street is a local road aligned generally north-south between Beech Street and Evelyn Street.

It accommodates two-way traffic within an unsealed carriageway of approximately 5 metres width.

The default 50km/h speed limit applies to River Street in the vicinity of the site.

2.3.3 Walnut Street

Walnut Street is a local street extending east from Wallan Road, terminating at the subject site in a in roundabout.

At its interface with the subject site it accommodates two-way traffic, with marked 90 degree parking within the northern verge, and informal parking provided along the southern side.

The default 50km/h speed limit applies to Walnut Street in the vicinity of the site.

2.3.4 Laurel Street

Laurel Street is a local street extending east from the Wallan Road / Plenty Road intersection, terminating at the subject site.

At its interface with the subject site it accommodates two-way traffic within a relatively narrow carriageway, accommodating informal 90 degree verge parking towards the western side, and formalised verge parking further east.

A 40km/h speed limit applies to Laurel Street in the vicinity of the site.



2.4 Traffic Volumes

2.4.1 Surveys

To understand existing traffic conditions in the site's vicinity, traffic volume surveys were undertaken at the following intersections on intersection on Saturday 26th February 2022 from 9:00AM-2:00PM and on Monday 28th February 2022 from 7:00AM-10:00AM and 2:30PM-6:00PM.

- Beech Street / Digger Hall Reserve Access / Football Ground Access;
- Beech Street / Playground Access; and
- Beech Street / Forest Street.


The peak hour results of the surveys are shown overleaf.

Turning movements to each of the site accesses from Beech Street (playground and Diggers Hall Reserve) are relatively modest during all peak periods, with only limited movements in and out of the site.

On the Saturday, turning movements into the football ground and showgrounds were considerably higher, which may have been attributable to set up activity for the rodeo being held Saturday evening. We understand that there were no games of football or netball scheduled during the survey.

Turning movements at the Forest Street intersection are considerable, with Forest Street operating as one of the primary access routes to Whittlesea Secondary College and the adjacent uses.








2.4.2 **Turn Lane Warrants**

The existing peak hour volumes at the Beech Street / Forest Street intersection have been assessed against the turn lane treatment warrants specified in the Austroads Guide to Traffic Management Part 6: Intersections, Interchanges and Crossings.


These warrants identify the need for dedicated right or left-turn lanes to service an intersection, effectively balancing the additional construction cost of higher-order treatments against the reduction in estimated crash costs.

A warrants assessment for movements at Forest Street are illustrated in Figure 3 and Figure 4 below.

The above figures suggest the intersection would benefit from provision of a channelised right-turn treatment, and that the left-turn deceleration lane provided is appropriate.



It is noted that A F Walker Reserve hosted a cricket match on the Saturday, and the Whittlesea Showgrounds hosted a rodeo from 3PM.

2.5.1.1 Total


On the Saturday, the surveys identified a constant supply of 429 parking spaces throughout the survey period. Peak occupancy occurred between 12:00 PM and 2:00 PM when 58 spaces were



occupied, leaving no fewer than 371 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 14% and 10% of capacity.

A view of the parking occupancy profile is provided in Figure 6 below.

Figure 6 Parking Occupancy Profile – Saturday 26th February 2022 – All Parking




2.5.1.2 On-Street

Limiting the survey data to on-street parking only, there was a supply of 207 parking spaces available for use. Peak occupancy occurred at 10:00 AM when 21 spaces were occupied, leaving no fewer than 186 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 10% and 6% of capacity.

A modest amount of parking demand was observed along the southern side of Laurel Street, but parking demands were broadly low throughout the precinct.

Figure 7 Parking Occupancy Profile – Saturday 26th February 2022 – On-Street Parking






2.5.1.3 Off-Street

Reviewing off-street parking only there was a supply of 222 parking spaces available for use. Peak occupancy occurred at 1:00 PM when 40 spaces were occupied, leaving no fewer than 182 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 18% and 14% of capacity.

The bulk of parking demands occurred within "Car Park B" at the end of Walnut Street adjacent to the swimming pool. This was approximately 50% full, with 22 spaces occupied at peak. Similarly, "Car Park E" adjacent to the tennis club was approximately 50% occupied (16 of 30 spaces) at peak.

2.5.2 Monday

2.5.2.1 Total

On the Monday, the surveys identified a constant supply of 429 parking spaces throughout the survey period. Peak occupancy occurred at 12:00 PM when 55 spaces were occupied, leaving no fewer than 374 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 13% and 3% of capacity.

A view of the parking occupancy profile is provided in Figure 6 below.

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Figure 9 Parking Occupancy Profile – Monday 28th February 2022 – All Parking


2.5.2.2 On-Street

Limiting the survey data to on-street parking only, there was a supply of 207 parking spaces throughout the survey period. Peak occupancy occurred at 3:00 PM when 38 spaces were occupied, leaving no fewer than 169 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 18% and 3% of capacity.

The bulk of parking demands occurred along Laurel Street adjacent to the school, with 21 of the 100 spaces occupied in this area throughout the day, increasing during the school pick up period.

Figure 10 Parking Occupancy Profile – Monday 28th February 2022 – On-Street Parking






2.5.2.3 Off-Street

Reviewing off-street parking only there was a supply of 222 parking spaces throughout the survey period. Peak occupancy occurred at 11:00 AM when 26 spaces were occupied, leaving no fewer than 196 spaces available for use. Parking utilisation varied between 12% and 4% of capacity.

Consistent with the Saturday survey, the bulk of parking demands occurred within "Car Park B", with a modest amount of parking also within "Car Park E". It is noted that there was no observed parking overflow associated with the Monday Whittlesea Market.

2.6 Crash History

Crash history information was obtained through the Department of Transport (VicRoads) CrashStats (the Victorian accident statistics and mapping program) for the latest available 5-year period in the vicinity of the site.

Three crashes were recorded in the vicinity of the site, shown in Figure 12 and summarised in Table 1.

Figure 12 Crash Locations




The above data does not suggest any critical road safety concerns, though the presence of two crashes at the Forrest Street / Beech Street intersection warrants consideration for any future interventions at this location.

2.7 Sustainable Transport

2.7.1 General

An extract of the TravelSmart Map for the City of Whittlesea is shown in Figure 13, highlighting the public transport, bicycle and pedestrian facilities in the area.

The map identifies walking paths along Beech Street and through the subject site running both east-west and north-south. An off-road cycling path is identified along the frontage of Whittlesea Secondary College.



2.7.3 Bicycle Facilities

2.7.3.1 Strategic Cycling Corridors

Strategic Cycling Corridors are important routes for cycling for transport and link up important destinations including the Central City, National Employment and Innovations Clusters, Metropolitan Activity Centres and other destinations of metropolitan and regional significance.

Strategic Cycling Corridors (SCC) are considered to be the arterials for bicycles, and have been designed to provide connected, low stress and safe routes, intended primarily for the use of cyclists for transport (rather than recreation).

Plenty Road is identified as a SCC south of Laurel Street, and is provided dedicated on-road facilities up to the intersection of Plenty Road / Beech Street and James Street.

There are no other formal cycling facilities in the vicinity of the site.

2.7.3.2 Strava Heatmap

Strava is a social network and training tool for cyclists, runners and swimmers. Users record their physical activity using a dedicated GPS device or utilise the mobile app, and upload the file to their profile. Strava anonymises this information and makes it available through their "Global Heatmap" tool, showing aggregated all public activities over the last two years across the world.

A view of the cycling heatmap in proximity to the study area is provided below in Figure 15. Routes of higher usage are brighter in colour.

Beech Street is the primary cycling route in the vicinity of the site, providing a key connection for sports cyclists training in the vicinity of the Kinglake Range. Each of Laurel Street, Forrest Street and River Street are regularly utilised, in addition to the path network through the site.



It is noted that this information includes all cycling activities recorded on the platform, inclusive of weekend trips, and all trips throughout the day. Additionally, the data is skewed towards sports cyclists, given that the bulk of commuter and recreational cyclists will not be tracking their rides.

3 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

3.1 Northern Regional Trails Strategy

Planning work undertaken by Arup on behalf of multiple northern metropolitan Councils identified a number of priority trail projects within Whittlesea Council. Of relevance to the subject site, this includes the Whittlesea Rail Trail.

This trail would extend from McDonalds Road in South Morang to Laurel Street in Whittlesea. Once completed, this trail would potentially funnel a high volume of recreational and touring cyclists into Whittlesea town centre, with opportunity to integrate facilities within Whittlesea Park including end-of-trip facilities, and trail parking.

While not specifically references within the document, plans illustrate a potential extension of the Plenty River Trail, through to Whittlesea and the subject site. If completed, this would offer the same opportunities.



4 ACCESS & MOVEMENT

The site is afforded a number of distinct vehicular accesses and car parking areas, as detailed in the figures below.

Figure 16 Access & Parking Arrangements – North




Figure 17 Access & Parking Arrangements – North-east

Installation of a regional playground and improvements to existing facilities is likely to increase the volume of drivers attracted to the precinct, primarily via the Investigate opportunities for safety or Forrest Street / Beech Street intersection. Existing traffic volumes through this intersection already warrant a right-turn treatment.
