



can be proud of and enjoy."

The first stage, which concluded in June, involved dredging the lake to remove silt and other pollutants that had accumulated on the lakebed.

The second stage, which is now under way, will see the lake drained to allow for the

installation of equipment that will filter and circulate the water.


A final stage, expected to commence towards the end of this year, provides for the construction of a raingarden and landscaping.

Mr Hopper said he was thrilled to see a comprehensive plan in place to improve the water quality and thanked the Friends of Peter Hopper Lake group for their advocacy.

"It's great to see it happening," he said.

City of Whittlesea Administrator Peita Duncan said Council's expert staff, including engineers and environmental scientists, had worked with specialist consultants to devise a long-term solution to the water quality issues.

How did the lake get its name? Peter Hopper started work at what was then the Shire of Whittlesea in the mid-1950s and served as shire engineer from 1969 until his retirement in 1988. As his retirement approached, it was a conversation with long-serving councillor and the City of Whittlesea's first





community to flourish

Did you know Council provides 147 services to our community, from weekly waste collections, home support for people in need and maternal and child health services to parks and open spaces, local roads and footpaths, playgrounds and sports fields?

We also build much-needed facilities and upgrade infrastructure across the City of Whittlesea.

Each year Council sets a Budget to deliver these important services and projects. The 2024–25 Budget includes \$315 million operating and \$108 million for capital works.

Chair Administrator Lydia Wilson said preparing the Budget was always a balancing act.

"With the increased cost of living right across Australia right now and the tightening of funds from other levels of government, Council is very aware of our expenditure.

"Our community needs us to deliver important infrastructure and services but we must also ensure we are financially sustainable to continue to deliver into the future," she said.

The main source of funding for projects and programs in the City of Whittlesea is Council rates.

Home game a van age

Sports players celebrate as work begins on the future Regional Sports Precinct in Mernda.

Netballers in the northern suburbs are excited at the prospect of having purpose-built courts close to home to play and train on.

The ever-growing popularity of netball means that courts are at a premium, with players regularly having to travel outside the municipality.

But with work ramping up on the Regional Sports Precinct in Mernda, there is relief in sight.

Preliminary groundworks are under way on the Everton Drive site on which an indoor stadium housing four multi-purpose courts and up to eight outdoor netball courts will sit.

Work on the gateway to the Regional Sports Precinct started in April with the extension of Everton Drive to Plenty Road and the creation of a new intersection.

The roadworks, which are expected to continue until early next year, will provide safe and convenient access to the sports precinct.

Mernda Netball Club secretary Alicia Frigo, whose daughter Ruby took up netball about four years ago, said the club had outgrown the area's facilities.

"Netball has become really big because it's a community sport that girls and boys can play and because of that there's such a need for more courts,"

"We have over 100 players and this season we're looking at 14 teams and we have to have somewhere that accommodates us all year round rain, hail or shine," she said.

City of Whittlesea Chair Administrator Lydia Wilson said the precinct will help address the shortage of netball and basketball courts in the northern suburbs.

"Council is committed to ensuring residents across the municipality have easy access to the facilities they need to live healthy lifestyles," she said.

The transport infrastructure servicing the future Regional Sports Precinct will be delivered by the City of Whittlesea in partnership with the Victorian Government.

New centre set to serve growing community

A young Donnybrook of family is counting down the days until the Murnong Community Centre opens its doors and provides the growing suburb with easy access to a range of vital services.

Beth and Ryan Wilson, who live just a short walk from the centre's Olivine Boulevard location, were excited to see construction begin in mid-May.

The \$11.4 million community centre, the first one to be built in Donnybrook, will provide a range of important services catering to residents of all ages, including a three and four-year-old kindergarten program, Maternal and Child Health Services and mini-branch library.

Organisations, community groups and residents will be able to hold events or run programs out of the centre's large community hall and multi-purpose activity rooms.

The community centre will provide important services catering to residents of all ages:



a three- and fouryear-old kindergarten program



Maternal and Child Health Services



mini-branch library for place-based events and programming



large community hall and multi-purpose activity rooms



a Changing Places facility and accessible public toilet. There will also be a Changing Places facility to support people with high care needs and an accessible public toilet available seven days a week.

"The Murnong Community Centre will provide interactive programs for people of all ages, as well as family and childhood support."

"I think the library will be a massive one for us," Beth said. "Currently there is nothing close by unless you go to Beveridge.

City of Whittlesea Administrator Christian Zahra AM said the centre, which is expected to open in early 2026, will reduce the need for residents to travel to access key services. The City of Whittlesea is contributing more than \$4 million to the project, with the Victorian Government providing additional funds via:

- \$4.5 million from the Victorian School Building Authority
- \$2 million from the 2021–22 Growing Suburbs Fund
- \$709,500 from the Living Libraries Infrastructure Program 2021–22
- \$180,000 from the Changing Places Funding Round 2023.

Connecting with Quarry Hills

The picturesque natural environment of Quarry Hills Parkland will be even more accessible to residents and visitors when 4.5 kilometres of new walking and cycling trails are added to the existing network.

The trails, which are expected to be complete in late 2024, will provide access to key lookout points with breathtaking views of the city and mountain ranges.

Epping-based mental health counsellor Vinay Nair has run the Whittlesea Walk and Talk group for more than two years.

"I think that Quarry Hills has such tremendous potential and it needs to be appreciated more, which these new trails will help to do."

Each Saturday morning at 9am, the group meets at Foothills Park and walks for about an hour in the Quarry Hills Parklands.

"We don't necessarily talk much; we just enjoy nature and the sunrise and the views of the city."

City of Whittlesea Chair Administrator Lydia Wilson said the Quarry Hills Connecting Trails, together with the Granite Hills Major Community Park and Aboriginal Gathering Place, will transform the park.

"Quarry Hills Parkland is the region's premier open space and the new trails will allow more people than ever to appreciate the site's stunning natural beauty," she said.

"The additional 4.5 kilometres of trails will be supported by interpretive signage that will highlight the site's significance to the traditional owners of the land, the Wurundjeri Willum Clan."

The project is funded by the City of Whittlesea, a \$322,000 grant from the Victorian Government's Growing Suburb Fund and \$1 million from the Suburban Parks Program.

Shining a light on solar recycling: From rooftops to recycling

Council is excited to be part of the circular economy and reduce environmental impacts by ensuring materials from old solar panels live on to create new products.

Council's very first solar PV system was installed on Thomastown Library in 2004 and recently decommissioned to make way for a larger system. But the journey doesn't end there for the solar panels.

In Victoria, solar panels are deemed e-waste and banned from landfill, so recycling becomes a vital way of reducing waste at the end of a panel's 20-25 year lifespan.

For our Thomastown Library solar panels, Lotus Energy, Australia's first solar panel recycler, based locally in Thomastown, will ensure an impressive 95 per cent of the materials in the solar panels are recovered and re-used. Materials such as silicone, glass, aluminium, copper and plastic are salvaged and ready to be re-purposed into items, such as tiles, benchtops and electronic cables.

- Reduce the risk of fires in landfill and rubbish trucks
- Improve the recovery and reuse of valuable materials.

New soft plastics recycling trial

Soft plastics recycling is now available in a new trial program.

Residents can drop off soft plastics into designated bins at the Wollert Landfill Transfer Station.

You can recycle soft plastics including plastic bags, bread bags, pasta and ice packets, vegetable produce bags and more.

If the plastic can be scrunched into a ball, it's likely acceptable for recycling through this service. Cling wrap/glad wrap is made from a different type of plastic and cannot be recycled through this service.

The soft plastics collected through this program will be transformed into oil for new plastic products. This process not only helps divert waste from landfill but also supports the creation of a circular economy, where materials are reused and repurposed.

The soft plastics recycling trial is an action from our Rethinking Waste Plan 2021-2030, which outlines our goal to become a low waste city.

Reservoir celebrates 170 years

Yan Yean Reservoir hosted a 170th anniversary celebration earlier this year, led by the Friends of Toorourrong community group.

Located near Whittlesea, Yan Yean Reservoir is an important part of Melbourne's history and has served as a major water source for 170 years. It still supplies clean water to millions in Melbourne's northern and western suburbs.

During the recent celebration event, it was clear that many locals still have a special connection to it.

"It's one of Melbourne's landmarks. It's a secret that no one seems to know about," said Rob Walker, whose family once lived in the reservoir's cottage.

The Friends of Toorourrong are instrumental in raising community awareness of the entire Yan Yean Water Supply System through events such as this.

"We are lucky to have this hidden gem in our municipality – a beautiful place to find respite from the bustle of city life," said Chair Administrator Lydia Wilson.

Funding win for transport hub

Work is progressing towards the development of a freight and logistics hub in Beveridge – the Beveridge Intermodal Precinct – following a Federal Budget announcement.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese recently visited the site to announce \$750 million additional funding in the Federal Budget towards the delivery of the Camerons Lane Interchange.

This funding will facilitate the delivery of the Beveridge Intermodal Precinct as a major freight and logistics hub in Melbourne's north.

The project will be developed in stages to balance operations, local infrastructure and longer-term master planning in and around the precinct.

The precinct is expected to contribute \$2.5 billion to the Victorian economy each year and, when fully developed, generate 20,000 jobs in the north.

National Intermodal has asked the Minister for Planning to prepare a change to the planning scheme to help get the first stage under way.

This stage will start with the construction of a basic rail terminal and aims to be up and running in 2025.

The next phase of development will see the expansion of the terminal, the addition of warehousing, and supporting infrastructure. The goal is to have this operational by around 2028/29.

Chair Administrator Lydia Wilson said, "The north of Melbourne is home to more than one million people with the population forecast to grow to just under 1.5 million by 2036. This investment in an important foundational piece of the project and will ensure job creation both now and into the future."

Rebates for reusable shopping carts

Residents are also encouraged to shop locally to reduce their carbon footprint.
