/ew sports courts come to life in Mernda

The City of Whittlesea's newly elected councillors have toured the site where sporting dreams will be made for years to come.

The regional sports precinct in Mernda represents a significant investment by Council in the health and happiness of the community.

Featuring an indoor stadium with four multi-purpose sports courts and eight outdoor netball courts, the facility will be a hub for recreational and competitive play.

Other features of the indoor stadium include changerooms, accessible toilets, foyer, reception, kiosk, office space, storage areas and more.

Earthworks to prepare the site for construction of the courts are well underway and Council is expecting to award a construction tender this year. City of Whittlesea Deputy Mayor, Cr Daniela Zinni said her fellow councillors enjoyed the opportunity to visit the site at the start of February.

"This precinct will be so important in promoting healthy and active lifestyles among our residents. But more than that, it will help to build social connections among people from all walks of life in our growing communities."

"This is a project that has been years in the planning and to see it progressing so well is really exciting," she said.

Late last year, the Federal Government announced \$11.5 million in funding across two programs to support the construction of the courts.

A \$10 million grant from the Thriving Suburbs Program will go towards the cost of the indoor stadium, while \$1.5 million from the Play Our Way Program will be put towards the outdoor netball courts.


This funding is in addition to a Victorian Government election commitment of \$10 million towards the indoor stadium.

The State Government has also contributed \$10 million from its Growth Areas Infrastructure Contribution fund to help build the transport infrastructure surrounding the site.

Granite Hills Major Community Park

Work on the Granite Hills Major Community Park – one of the largest projects in our capital program – is progressing well.

Construction of the wetlands and boardwalk is complete and work is continuing on the installation of many of the park's other features, including playgrounds, shelters and accessible toilets.

The project, which is supported by funding from the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, is expected to be finished later in the year.



Gorge Road streetscape upgrade

Upgrades to the streetscape at the Gorge Road shopping precinct in South Morang will provide a better experience for traders and their customers.

The project, which started in November 2024, will improve the precinct's on-street car park, drainage system and raingarden, and will also include new walkways and decking. All shops will remain open as normal while the work takes place. The project is expected to finish in the coming months.

The project is funded by the City of Whittlesea and the Victorian Government via a grant from its Growing Suburbs Fund.



Peter Hopper Lake revitalisation

The restoration of Peter Hopper Lake at Mill Park is progressing well, with work to drain water from the lake starting in January.

The current stage of works includes removal of the central island and construction of a pollutant trap, sediment basin and raingarden. It comes after more than 3000 cubic metres of silt was removed from the lakebed last year.

This project is jointly funded by the and Catchments Program and the City of Whittlesea.



Wollert Central kindergarten on school site

A new kindergarten located on the Wirrigirri Primary School site in Wollert, is on track to welcome children through its doors on the first day of term one in 2026.

Construction of the three-room kindergarten building is progressing well and work on the outdoor space and car park has begun.

The finished facility will deliver up to 198 new kindergarten places for the community.

Whittlesea Park improved access

Works to make it easier for pedestrians, cyclists and emergency vehicles to access Whittlesea Park are underway. Construction of the Laurel Street path is complete and works on replacing the existing timber bridge over Plenty River with a concrete bridge began in January. The project will also deliver about 620 metres of new pedestrian

and cycle paths, as well as rest stops, improved street lighting and signage. The Victorian Government, through its

Growing Suburbs Fund, is matching Council's

\$500,000 contribution to the project.

Making a big 80/9

A revamped playground is set to make a splash among children and families when it is unveiled later this year.

The Hill Top Playground and Splash Park in Doreen will have a range of exciting new features catering for people of all ages and abilities.

The main attraction at the Landano Way site will undoubtedly be a 150 square metre splash pad featuring jets, misters and other water-based features.

The updated playground will have several slides, climbing nets, trampolines, cubby, rockers and basket, toddler and standard seat swings.

There will also be a focus on nature play with a trail, balance logs, boulders and steppers established under the park's existing trees.

Visitors to the playground will have access to a new public toilet and

Changing Places facility, as well as a new shelter with picnic tables.

Local mum Nicole said her two children, Amelia, 10, and Hudson, 8, were excited at the prospect of having a splash park on their doorstep.

Construction of the playground began in mid-January and work on the new car park will finish in February.

The playground will be closed to the public until works are completed in mid-2025.

The project is funded by the City of Whittlesea, the Federal Government through \$1.5 million from its Investment in Our Communities Program and the State Government through \$500,000 from its Open Space for Everyone -Better Parks and Playgrounds Program.

Road extension provides local relief

A road extension will make the morning and afternoon school runs easier for two school communities.

We have extended Baltrum Drive to serve the newly established Wirrigirri Primary School and provide an alternative access point to Glowrey Catholic Primary School.

The 210-metre-long two-lane extension will help to reduce traffic congestion in the busy neighbourhood and provide safer pedestrian links. In addition to the road extension, the project also includes installation of street lighting and about 410 metres of concrete drainage.

The project is scheduled to be completed in March 2025.

The Victorian School Building Authority and Melbourne Water are contributing towards the cost of the roadworks and drainage respectively.

Better sorting with new-look rubbish bin lids

Starting in May this year, we will be rolling out replacement rubbish bin lids across the City of Whittlesea to bring us into line with the Victorian Government's new standard bin lid colours.







This change will standardise bin lid colours across Victoria, making it easier for you to correctly sort your waste and identify the rubbish bin even if you move house, visit friends or family, or travel within the state.

If your rubbish bin currently has a dark green lid, it will be replaced with a red lid.

Simply place your bin out on your regular collection day and leave it there until 5pm. Our team will handle the rest.

To minimise waste, the old green lids will be recycled into new lids rather than sent to landfill.

Taking action on trashy behaviour

Our dedicated Litter Enforcement Team investigates all illegally dumped rubbish. Community reports help our investigations, which often lead to fines.

Most people in our community do the right thing in disposing of waste, using many services to get rid of waste and recycling throughout the year. However, a small number of individuals and businesses choose to illegally dump rubbish on our roadsides, nature strips and parks.

Recently, a developer reported rubbish dumped from a large truck onto vacant land in Wollert, providing important details including the truck's registration number, CCTV footage and information from others.

We investigated this evidence, tracking the truck back to a company that was hired to remove rubbish from a property locally and dispose of it properly. We compiled enough evidence to issue the maximum \$10,000 fine.

Since June 2024, we've issued more than \$85,000 in fines for illegally dumped rubbish.

To help us take action on illegal dumping, when reporting an issue, you can share identifying information such as a vehicle registration number.

Where does our food and garden waste go?

Have you ever wondered what really happens to the food scraps and garden clippings that you and your family put in your green-lidded bin?

It's all being turned into valuable compost that helps our community grow. Local farms, kindergartens and community gardens are already benefiting from this compost and more are lining up to receive some.

In 2024, residents helped stop more than 19,377 tonnes of food and garden waste from going to landfill, where it can take decades to break down and releases harmful gases.

We're proud to say that our community is getting it right, nearly all of the time. The City of Whittlesea resident's food and garden waste bins have a 2.5 per cent contamination rate.

To make things easier and provide you with more options for waste disposal, we also provide every household, including renters, two free hard rubbish collections and a range of free and discounted waste vouchers each year.

More than 5,000 native trees and shrubs were planted at Quarry Hills Parkland as part of our Conservation Reserves Tree Planting Program.

Back to nature in **Quarry Hills**

Through the ongoing dedication of local residents and community groups working in partnership with Council, Quarry Hills Parkland is being steadily restored.

Throughout winter and early spring, more than 5,000 native trees and shrubs were planted as part of our Conservation Reserves Tree Planting Program.

The program is restoring the native eucalypt and granitic hills woodland vegetation once cleared from the park, which includes eucalypts, drooping sheoaks, and silver banksias which were removed in the 1930s.

The project improves habitats for local fauna like the Krefft's glider and helps increase tree canopy cover.

With over 25,000 more trees and shrubs planned for the next planting season through the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action funded BushBank program, Quarry Hills is set to continue to flourish.

You can explore Quarry Hills on the new Connecting Trails. The walking and cycling trails showcase the beauty of the parkland with mountain and city views, and highlight the parklands significance to the Traditional Owners of the land, the Wurundjeri Willum Clan.

Let's all do our part around schools – take a few extra minutes to find a legal parking spot and make safety a priority.










Park in designated areas – don't stop in a no-stopping zone

Major upgrades for kindergartens in Lalor, Epping and Mill Park

Three local kindergartens are getting major upgrades.

These improvements will create 194 new kindergarten places, making early education more accessible for families.

Dalton Road Kindergarten in Thomastown, Derby Meadows Preschool in Epping, and The Stables Kindergarten in Mill Park will all benefit.

Derby Meadows and Dalton Road will also include maternal and child health services providing families with a one-stop space for essential services. This is part of the \$24.25 million Building Blocks Partnership and supports the Best Start, Best Life reform.

The Victorian Government has contributed \$13 million to this project, with additional funding from the City of Whittlesea.
